

Building a Community-Authored Framework for Repair, Restoration & Reinvestment in West Oakland

The EVOAK! Knowledge Bank and Harm Repair Initiative brought together a coordinated series of research campaigns that formed the backbone of a community-driven framework for restorative development in West Oakland. These projects combined data, storytelling, design, and policy to quantify harm, preserve cultural memory, and guide equitable reinvestment—each contributing to a unified strategy for comprehensive and creative community development centered on legacy Black residents.

Research Campaigns & Partners
